



Dr. Julie G. Young

Dr. Young is a historian of migration, Mexico and Latin America, and Catholicism in the Americas. Her prize-winning book, *Mexican Exodus: Emigrants, Exiles, and Refugees of the Cristero War* (Oxford University Press, 2015), examines Mexican religious exiles, political refugees, and labor emigrants in the United States during Mexico's Cristero war. She co-edited *Local Church, Global Church: Catholic Activism in Latin America from Rerum Novarum to Vatican II* (The Catholic University of America Press, 2015). She has published scholarly articles in *The Americas*, *The Catholic Historical Review*, *Mexican Studies/Estudios Mexicanos*, *Modernism*, and the *Journal on Migration and Human Security*. Dr. Young has been a fellow at the Kluge Center at the Library of Congress, as well as the Institute for Policy Research at Catholic University. In 2020-2021, she was a fellow at the Luce/ACLS Program in Religion, Journalism & International Affairs. She is currently researching a new book about right-wing Catholicism in Mexico during the twentieth century, and she frequently writes for the media about immigration, border issues, and Catholic immigration history.

El Dr. Young es un historiador de la migración, México y América Latina, y el catolicismo en las Américas. Su libro premiado, *Mexican Exodus: Emigrants, Exiles, and Refugees of the Cristero War* (Oxford University Press, 2015), examina a los exiliados religiosos mexicanos, los refugiados políticos y los emigrantes laborales en los Estados Unidos durante la Guerra Cristera de México. Coeditó *Iglesia local, Iglesia global: Activismo católico en América Latina desde la Rerum Novarum hasta el Vaticano II* (The Catholic University of America Press, 2015). Ha publicado artículos académicos en *The Americas*, *The Catholic Historical Review*, *Mexican Studies/Estudios Mexicanos*, *Modernism* y *Journal on Migration and Human Security*. El Dr. Young ha sido miembro del Centro Kluge de la Biblioteca del Congreso, así como del Instituto de Investigación de Políticas de la Universidad Católica. En 2020-2021, fue becaria del Programa Luce/ACLS en Religión, Periodismo y Asuntos Internacionales. Actualmente está investigando para un nuevo libro sobre el catolicismo de derecha en México durante el siglo XX, y con frecuencia escribe para los medios sobre inmigración, temas fronterizos e historia de la inmigración católica.
